Happy Birthday!

I wonder how you like to celebrate your birthday? Quality time with loved ones, delicious food and drink, beautiful flowers, presents - these are just a few of the ways people like to celebrate. I wonder which of these might play a part in your next birthday celebration on June 8th?

June 8th this year is Pentecost Sunday, the birth-day of the Church. It's OUR birthday! The very first Pentecost Sunday is described for us in the Bible, in the book of Acts chapter 2. Luke describes how Jesus' disciples had gathered together in Jerusalem during the Jewish festival of Pentecost. Jerusalem was crowded with Jews from all over the Roman Empire who had gathered to celebrate the bringing of the wheat harvest to the Temple. In contrast, Jesus' disciples were gathered together to wait.

After Jesus' resurrection on Easter Sunday, He had appeared to them many times over a period of several weeks. Then, just as He was about to go back to His Father in heaven, He instructed them, 'Do not leave Jerusalem, but wait for the gift my Father promised'.

On Pentecost Sunday their patient waiting was rewarded as tongues of fire appeared to touch them and they began to speak in other tongues. The gift had arrived, the outpouring of God's Holy Spirit. The noise they made drew a crowd who were amazed to find the disciples praising God in many languages from across the Roman world. Peter went out and preached to the crowd and three thousand people were converted. The Church had been born!

So this Pentecost, let's remember who we really are - not the combination of fine buildings, fine music and fine liturgy - the combination of ordinary people filled with God's Holy Spirit, sent out by Him to continue His ministry to a needy world.

What will we do to celebrate?

WILD LIFE Diana Tennyson

**Sycamore Gap tree**: I make no apologies for mentioning this tree again. The trial of the two men accused of felling it continues at the time of writing, and I receive messages from residents about its progress. The tree was truly magnificent and took well over a century to grow, but just a few minutes to cut down. It was also globally renowned, standing at the end of the Roman frontier in northern England, and had been featured in countless films, photographs and paintings.

Sadly, overnight on 27 September, 2023, someone chopped it down under cover of darkness, and this caused 'international outrage and condemnation'. Over the last week we have heard details of the trial of two men accused of felling it. Both deny being involved despite a video lasting over two minutes being found on one of the accused's phones. Both men deny criminal damage to the tree and to Hadrian's Wall, but the real damage is also inflicted on all the people who loved the tree, and came to the spot to take pictures of memorable family events.

Tree felling for development: Trees, especially mature trees, absorb a great deal of water. A large, mature tree can consume g hundreds of gallons of water every day

depending on the tree species, size and other conditions. They absorb water through their roots and use it for photosynthesis and transpiration. A 100 foot tall mature tree can consume more than 11,000 gallons of water in a single growing season, according to a report from the Department of Forestry. This varies of course, depending on rainfall, the temperature and wind which will influence the amount of water a tree needs and absorbs.

**Photosynthesis:** A small percentage (approx. 5 per cent) of the water a tree absorbs is used to manufacture sugars for the tree's food.

The majority of the water (approx. 95 per cent) is released back into the atmosphere through the leaves in the form of water vapour, a process called transpiration. This is a crucial part of the water cycle.

Take a look at the root system of a mature Copper Beech at Chawton's Recreation Ground! Anvone felling a mature tree for the purpose of gaining planning permission for development should that this could remember backfire. There has for example been so much flooding in Alton Lane, Four Marks, that planning officers are actively discouraging



developers from accessing developments via Alton Lane. Flooding was a major issue at Four Marks Primary School in February, and I highlighted the problem in my April article. We had little rain by comparison during April and the ground began to dry out. However, when this happens it is more difficult for the ground to absorb water. It runs straight over the land, and straight downhill as it frequently does in Alton Lane causing a major problem

at Five Cross Roads and the Primary School.

Wildlife Corridor: The wildlife or ecology corridor at Holland Drive, Medstead, Azalea estate, has done exceptionally well. It runs from the entrance at Boyneswood Road along Holland Drive, to Wakes Close (a small development of nine dwellings constructed by Imperial Homes). I donated primroses and cowslips last year, but was delighted to hear that the developer had supplied seeds to



enhance the area. When they dug out the drain, resident Lorraine Potter, worked with the site manager to add some top soil, and they watered it all summer to help establish the seedlings. Trinity, the maintenance company, also paid for spring bulbs. Then a hedgehog house was delivered, and three more trees have also been planted, so the area is becoming very wildlife friendly.

**Nesting birds:** Again this year Lorraine has been very successful with her nesting birds. Her garden pergola also provides a sheltered home for three Blackbird fledglings. I have received some lovely pictures of the fledglings being fed by the parent birds which I am again sharing with readers. See end of article for pictures

**Attention, Brown-Tail Moth:** This is the time of year for the Brown-tail Moth caterpillars to appear. We are advised to avoid contact  $_{\rm o}$  with these caterpillars. They have been

over-wintering in the silken 'tents' you often see on bushes and other plants. The caterpillar is brown with red and white markings, and is very hairy. The hairs provide the moth with protection during its life cycle. The hairs also break off as barbs and contact with your skin can cause rashes, skin irritation, and headaches and breathing difficulties.

After accidental contact you should wash your hands in soapy water and clear your eyes with an eyewash. It is important to seek medical advice if symptoms are severe or persist.

**Wildflower Verge (Pooks Hill):** Again wild flowers have been spectacular on this verge this spring. It has been full of primroses and anemones. The verge is also important for our rare orchid, the violet helleborine. Information and photographs have been forwarded to Hampshire Biodiversity Information Centre (HBIC) so the verge can officially become a road verge of ecological importance (RVEI) and so that white posts can be installed when they become available. I have written to Nicky Court (HBIC Manager) and Tony Mundell (BSBI) Recorder. I have now heard back from Sarah Callegari, Acting HBIC Manager, who will conduct a survey.

Pooks Hill is also important historically as the Hon. Mrs. Victor Bruce, Mildred Mary Petre, once lived here. She was a famous motorist, speedboat racer, aviator and businesswoman. She was the first woman to fly around the world (not over oceans) solo. There is a memorial to Mrs. Victor Bruce at Golders Green Crematorium in London. Her friend Amy Johnson, also a famous aviator who was the first woman to fly solo from London to Australia, used to visit her at Pooks Hill. Amy would take off and land in

the field adjacent to the bungalow.

#### MEDSTEAD MUSIC RECITAL

#### Raises over £900 for Worthy Causes

On Saturday 26th April, eleven talented musicians delighted a large appreciative audience with a wide variety of music ranging from Handel to a recently composed duet by our local composer Jenny Bateman.

The first half of the concert opened with a rousing rendition of Irving Berlin's 'There's no Business Like Show Business' sung by all the performers.

Alison Crow gave an evocative performance of Grieg's beautiful Solveig's Song by Edward Grieg.

We also enjoyed a most beautiful performance of Handel's Ombra Mai Fu sung by Annabel Lofthouse.

We were very fortunate to have three flautists from Alton Concert Band amongst our performers. The first flute number was Widor's Romance Op 34, beautifully played by Kathy Starkey.

The audience were also treated to 2 contrasting piano duets. Firstly, a very atmospheric performance of 2 movements from Ravel's Mother Goose Suite (performed to commemorate the 150-year anniversary of his birth) was expertly performed by Pande Shahov and Patrick Busby. The first half concluded with an ingenious piano duet arrangement of the romantic and very popular Adagio from Rachmaninoff's 2<sup>nd</sup> piano concerto, beautifully performed by Jenny Griffiths and Patrick Busby.

After a short interval the second half commenced with Schubert's masterpiece: 'The Shepherd on The Rock' – a song arranged for soprano, flute and piano. This was expertly performed by Lorna Silvester on the flute and Wendy Busby soprano.

John lofthouse followed this with an amazing virtuoso rendition of The Lord Chancellor's Song from lolanthe by Gilbert and Sullivan hugely appreciated by the audience.

In complete contrast we then had 'Dawn of Peace', a beautiful duet for 2 flutes expertly performed by Lorna Silvester and Maureen Veigh.

Next came local composer Jenny Batemen's duet Roses sung most sensitively and skilfully by Jeremy Griggs and Wendy Busby.

Chopin's virtuoso 1<sup>st</sup> Ballade followed played with great feeling and accuracy by Patrick Busby. This piece was made famous in the epic film 'The Pianist' about a musician surviving against all the odds in Poland in the 2<sup>nd</sup> World War.

The concert ended with all the musicians singing a stirring rendition of The Eton Boating Song.

The concert raised over £900 split between The Kathryn's Mercy Home 'KMH' Charity and funds for a much-needed lifesaving new defibrillator for Medstead.

KMH provides support and education to children and their families from some of the most disadvantaged communities in South India.

Our meeting in May welcomed Geoff Peach who came to talk about how 'Flower shows can be Fun! He spoke about his experience as a show judge and what the exhibits need to be to get best in show! He told us an awful lot about shows and went to his first at 23 years old. He looked and thought he could do better and started growing his own. He is accomplished at showing and how to present flowers sometimes using paper in the right vase to get them to stand up. Checking the flower or vegetable is in the right class is very important. Is the vegetable the right length, shape and colour? Geoff felt growing potatoes in a bag was best and cleaning them for a show could be done in a little water and washing up liquid! Make sure the exhibits were of similar size in each category. Always label vegetable varieties on the exhibit and courgettes should have flowers on a stem as well to show you grew them and not from a shop! Stewards at shows give advice and help you understand what needs to be done when showing for best results from judges. Judges will award the prizes. There were lots of great tips and advice and Geoff inspired the club to start showing

#### **REGULAR FEATURES**

It was a little too cold to inspect the colonies at the weekend, so I've had to delay a few days.

If the hive is opened when cold, it may damage the brood as they need to be kept at 35°C. The smallest colony is building up slowly, but making honey, the middle colony is doing very well and has a super full of dry (capped) honey ready to take off and another super almost full, but largely wet, (uncapped). The last colony (i.e. furthest away) also has two supers full, but wet. Wet honey cannot be harvested as it will breed bacteria that can be harmful. The bees will dry it, using the warmth from the brood chamber, and cap it off with wax when dry. I hope to have enough honey to extract at the end of May, or early June, ready for sale at the village fete.

The last and biggest colony has multiple swarm cells. A swarm cell is constructed when there is an overabundance of bees in the hive, and they need to swarm to create more room. It looks a little like a peanut shell and appears on the edges of the brood frames. The old queen leaves with part of the colony to find a new home. The new queen from the swarm cell stays to look over the rest of the colony.

A supersedure cell is where the current queen is not doing her part in the hive and therefore the hive creates a new queen to take, or supersede, her place. Multiple queens will fight to the death to rule the colony. The current queen is quite old so I'm happy to have a new queen, even though it will mean the loss of many bees and some honey. Also, when a colony has decided it needs to swarm it is very difficult to persuade it otherwise.

With warmer weather on the way I'm hoping the smaller colony will pick up, and the larger one will swarm and recovery quickly. Now that I have pretty full colonies, I'm not that interested in collecting swarms. However, I will collect if they are in an awkward position – 07771-862-890.

#### **COUNTRY MATTERS:** Lambing Report

The weather has been wonderful with sunny days that are warm unless the wind is blowing which seems to come from the north east. The lack of rainfall is great unless you are a farmer or gardener but I think all of us enjoy blue skies and clear nights. The rainfall has been minimal - 99mm (4 ins) in February, 8.5 mm (0.34 ins) in March, 24.5 mm (0.99 ins) in April and nothing to measure yet in May. A total of 132 mm (5.34ins) in 3 months or 44 mm a month. The rolling 12 month rainfall has dropped from 52ins a year in January to 41.8 ins at the end of April – by the end of May it will probably be much lower. The winds I mentioned have quickly evaporated any rain that has fallen. The ground is dry and plants will be under stress and yields in the fields or gardens will be reducing unless irrigated. However, most plants will survive and watering will not make much difference but will deplete the water reserves. The south of England is drier that many Mediterranean and even African countries. This is especially true when the UK population density is considered - lots of people and not much rain. The Government plans to build hundreds of thousands of new houses seems to ignore the fact that each extra resident will have a water need and nothing is being done to increase the water supply – to my mind that is a policy for a crisis in the near future.

Lambing had just begun when I wrote the May edition of Country Matters. The end of term report is as follows – all went well with 22 out of 23 ewes producing lambs. There are 3 sets of triplets, 6 singles and the rest are twins so 41 lambs running around. Not one lamb has died which was a great result – but a long way to go before they are sold. I was only required to lamb 2 ewes – one who had a breech lamb (coming backwards) and another that had 2 large lambs and she seemed to be struggling so I helped.


The majority of lambs are born front feet first with the head tucked between the front legs. As soon as the mouth appears the lamb can start breathing assuming that mucus is not blocking the airways. When a breech birth with the back feet coming first the lamb will usually be ok so long as it is born quickly – if slow the lamb can suffocate because the head and mouth is the last to emerge into the air. If a breech birth and the back legs are under the body – effectively bum first delivery – it can become very tight and assistance is needed to get the lamb out quickly by pushing the lamb forwards in to the womb space and then finding the back feet and pulling them out first. Unsurprisingly the rest follows once the feet and legs reach the outside world. Usually, the lambs will be able to stand within a few minutes – sometimes almost immediately which is pretty amazing.

The ewes will be shorn in the next few weeks and all sheep will then be treated with a spray to protect them against fly strike. This is a particularly nasty problem if it occurs – flies lay eggs in the fleece and these quickly develop into maggots which burrow into the flesh. It is easy to prevent with the spray and even organically farmed sheep have a derogation to use this treatment. The traditional way to prevent this problem was to dip the sheep but that is rarely used these days and the most effective active ingredient (chemical) which was used is no longer approved.

I am writing this on 12th May – if we don't receive a good volume of rain soon I would expect the combines to be starting to cut the early crops by the end of June – just 6 weeks away. Grain prices are very low at present – for harvest between now and September around £165 tonne for wheat – and even November offers are below £200 tonne for feed wheat. Without a better return more land will be rested or built upon – there is no point in producing food which has a negative financial outcome – until the laws of supply and demand push prices up again. The EU and UK Government support which farmers used to receive effectively enabled food production to continue despite the market fluctuations – but that protection has gone and the incentive to invest for the future of businesses and the environment.

Back to sheep – the lambs are very playful and amusing to watch. I have taken some mobile phone videos of them playing and will send a couple to John Stockdale to circulate on the Bentworth village email system for anyone interested to download and watch.
