Dear Friends

Harvest time is here again! It's that season of the year when Harvest Festivals abound and familiar hymns are enjoyed by many.

But I have to admit that over the past few years I've felt increasingly uneasy when singing 'We plough the fields and scatter' - because, in reality, we don't. Most of us have never ploughed fields or scattered seed, and most modern farmers don't do it either.

Back in 1782, when the hymn was written in Germany, over 75% of the population worked in agriculture. Today in the UK it's less than 1.4%, and only $\frac{1}{2}$ of these grow crops from seed. The hard truth is that very, very few people in this country (less than 0.5%) are involved in producing fields of crops from seed.

And within that tiny number, ploughing is becoming increasingly unpopular. Defra is now encouraging farmers to adopt 'min till' instead. This disturbs the soil far less and thereby protects the organisms which live in the soil, thus protecting the soil's structure and fertility. Fewer and fewer farmers actually plough.

Scattering the seed is also on the decline. Now that farm vehicles come equipped with GPS, the seed is placed very carefully in the soil at just the right depth and density for the particular soil type in that precise section of the field. Almost nobody actually scatters the seed.

So we don't plough and we don't scatter, which could make the hymn seem somewhat quaint and unreal.

But does it matter? Does it matter if what we sing is quaint and unreal?

What bothers me is the nagging thought that if people hear us singing these songs, they might think our whole Christian faith is quaint and unreal. And worse still, they might think that Jesus Himself is quaint and unreal!

But this is not to say that the entire hymn is without value. Regardless of modern farming methods, we can still rejoice that 'All good gifts around us are sent from heav'n above', we can still 'thank the Lord for all His love', and we can still offer Him our 'humble, thankful hearts'.

FIRST TIME MARATHON



HARVEST CHURCH - FRESH START Mark Rumsby

Do you want to break free from a life-controlling habit such as smoking, gambling, over-eating, internet or social media addiction, shopping compulsions, binge drinking, taking drugs, etc. – in fact any habit which once might have brought us comfort or fun, but is now spoiling our daily living?

Fresh Start is a 9-week course based on principles from the 12-steps-of-recovery process, backed by 1-to-1 coaching and a support group of others wanting to tackle their dependencies. It's **free** and completely confidential.

The next local course will start with an introductory session on Wednesday 8th October, 7:30 – 9pm, at Alton Maltings. It will be led by Fresh Start coaches, Ann and Anna.

After previous local courses, a man tackling an internet addiction said: "I'd like to thank you...for putting on the Fresh Start course and helping me achieve my goals...I am very grateful for the work you did with us." Another, tackling a gambling addiction, said: "I was gambling to excess and constantly worried and anxious over money. I am now happier and am getting my priorities right... I can never say THANK YOU enough times as I never thought I could beat this addiction". A woman now in recovery from alcohol addiction said: "I wouldn't be where I am today, if I hadn't come on Fresh Start".

If you want to be free of a life-controlling habit, join the Fresh Start course. Or if you know someone who wants to tackle such a habit, recommend Fresh Start to them.

Action Hampshire Is your Parish meeting local housing needs? Anna Miles

Many rural communities are facing a guiet crisis. Local people those who grew up in the village, work nearby, or have family ties, are increasingly unable to find homes they can afford. Without action, rural communities risk losing the very people who keep them thriving.

Action Hampshire is a local charity who provides Rural Housing Enabling (RHE) services to support communities and parish councils to deliver the homes needed in their community. RHEs act as an independent advisor providing impartial assistance in developing affordable and community led housing for people with a local connection and will work with and on behalf of rural communities to address the shortage of affordable homes within the parish - homes specifically for local people who are priced out of the general housing market.

These homes can be for rent or sale, and eligibility for occupancy is based on a strong local connection, such as living in the parish currently, having previously lived there with family still in the area or working locally in essential roles (e.g. teachers, shopkeepers, farm workers).

Why it matters

Hampshire has a serious housing affordability gap. Property prices are high, while median house price was **10 times** the wages are below average, in 2023, the

average wage.

This forces many households to leave their communities, which can lead to:

Closure of local services like pubs, shops, and schools

Loss of community diversity and sustainability

Limited turnover in existing affordable housing stock

Unlike general housing developments, rural affordable housing built on rural exception sites is reserved for people with a local connection - helping villages retain their identity and support their services. Rural Exception Sites are small plots of land just outside or adjacent to village boundaries that are permitted as exceptions to standard planning rules because they meet a proven local need. These sites can accommodate small-scale housing developments (typically 4–10 homes) which are retained in perpetuity for occupancy by local people.

What can you do?

Even if you're not directly affected, you can help raise awareness and encourage local action:

Speak to your Parish Council Ask them to contact Action Hampshire to **request a free Parish Housing Profile.** This provides an overview of the current housing situation in your area.

Support a Housing Need Survey This survey identifies the type and amount of housing needed locally. It provides evidence to help communities make informed decisions and may encourage landowners to offer land for development. These are usually commissioned by your Parish Council and can be carried out by Action Hampshire.

Know a local Landowner? If you know someone with land near the village, they might be interested in offering it as a Rural Exception Site. Landowners receive a fixed payment per property built but they will also be supporting their local community. Ask them to get in touch with Action Hampshire

Affordable housing is about more than bricks and mortar - it's about keeping building sustainable communities that will thrive for generations to come. Contact Action Hampshire housing@actionhampshire.org or find out more by visiting www.actionhampshire.org.uk

The bees have done very well as we have harvested nearly 200 jars, which are now ready

for sale. As usual all, equipment and wax cappings and waste form the filter go back to the apiary for the bees to clean up. The empty supers go back on the hives, so the bees can mop up leftover honey and re use the wax honeycomb. There has been a large number of wasps getting in on the party too, but thankfully no nests in the garden or house. Also, no sign of hornets, Asian or otherwise.

This time of year is not good for the drones, the male bees, as it is payback time when they get evicted or killed by the workers as they are surplus to requirements. The queen will be laying winter worker bees who will live longer than normal and the colony will be depleting in numbers.

Soon I will be taking off the empty supers and treating the hive for veroa mites. This is an organic treatment based on thyme oil and doesn't affect any of the honey we harvest. If you'd like to buy some honey it is available at Horsley gate, or by order for more than four jars, - 07771862890.

## **COUNTRY MATTERS - Autumnal Weather**

The dry spell has ended and autumnal weather is here with wind and rain. Up until the end of August the rolling rainfall figure has dropped to 917mm (37ins) from 1283 mm (52 inches) in January 2025 which is a 30% fall.

The harvest results are in and it has been a disappointing year caused primarily by the wet autumn of 2024 followed by the dry spring. The crops were planted late in wet conditions and the plants did not establish deep root structures. The plant populations were sub optimal because a lower percentage of seeds planted actually germinated and grew. When the dry period began in late February and continued until late summer the moisture that is deep within the soil could not be accessed by the plants. The dry spring and summer obviously did reduce yields but it was the poor state of the plants that caused a lot of the yield loss.

There were exceptions – early planted crops that did establish well and as ever the best most fertile soils will produce better crops. Nationally tonnage for all crops is thought to be about 11 million tonnes which is substantially down from what used to be the normal of 15 million tonnes. This is caused by lower cropped areas due to land being taken for building, being used for environmental crops and farmers not planting the poorer land because of the low crop prices. The highest prices in 2022 were close to £1000 for milling wheat but now milling wheat is around £200 per tonne. The UK operates in a world market and world prices are low because there have been good yields in many regions.

One of the consequences of the much heralded trade deal between the UK and USA has been the total closure of the UK's bioethanol industry. Government mandates dictate that fuels for road vehicles – both petrol and diesel – must contain bioethanol. This industry had 2 large industrial facilities that employed many people and supported farms in the north of England to produce this ethanol for the greener fuels. The US bioethanol is certified as a waste byproduct when imported into the UK and therefore has a 19% tariff removed. The identical UK produced bioethanol is not classed as a waste product and has to pay the 19% duty to the UK Exchequer. This makes it completely uneconomic to produce compared to the "waste" US product.

This is a completely bonkers scenario whereby an identical US product is imported and favoured over a home produced product - so our industry closes.

The environmental aspects of transporting these 1.4 billion litres of "green" fuels per year from the American mid-West are pretty horrendous – a net loss to the world climate. As importantly in the UK thousands of people have been made redundant from the facilities and supporting services. Additionally, the UK bio ethanol plants were the only sources of carbon dioxide (CO2) production in the UK which is used in food production and health care – this will now also have to be imported.

Solar panels on buildings or farmland can convert the sun's energy to electricity. It is not the heat of the sun but the solar radiance (sunlight) that is harnessed and converted to direct current electricity. To be used in the national grid the DC electricity has to pass through an inverter which converts it to alternating current (AC). The ideal temperatures for panels to work are around 18 -24 centigrade. Above those temperatures the efficiency drops by 0.3-0.5 % for every degree. There have been suggestions that vast areas of Africa should be covered in panels to harness the light and convert it to electricity before sending it in undersea cables to the UK and northern Europe. This plan totally ignores that the panels in hot countries the panels do not work efficiently and have a much shorter lifespan because of the extreme temperatures. Australia and the Southern US states have discovered that high temperatures do limit solar panel production levels and lifespan.

Similarly, there is an expectation that wind farms will meet many of our energy needs. This ignores the fact that one of the consequences of global warming are lower average wind speeds. Global wind speeds have dropped by 10% on average in the last few decades and are much lower in areas such as Europe due to the increasing temperatures in the North and South poles known as Arctic warming and therefore less of a temperature gradient. The lower temperature differential between the poles and the rest of the world results in lower wind speeds. A 2025 article in Nature Climate Change predicts that in some areas wind speeds will drop by up to 40% over the next 25 years. There will still be damaging storms but the average wind speeds will decrease.

Wind farms also suffer from an effect known as "wind wash" where the turbines in the front line receive all of the wind but those in lines further back receive less wind because the front turbines have effectively slowed the wind passing through the area. The rear turbines are therefore less efficient.

Enjoy the autumn colours in our Hampshire countryside in the comina weeks - winter maybe approaching but October can be quite spectacular.






