Jane was a lovely person who rarely had a critical word for anyone. She was unfailingly cheerful and never complained about anything - even when her health was failing in her final weeks. Like many of her generation, she was fiercely independent and it was rare that she would accept help. It used to amuse me that she loved being the first to hear and share new 'village news'. How she found these things out so quickly baffles me - but it was never malicious. She seemed to have an endless source of energy and was a bit like a bird, often popping out of her gate when you walked past to have a chat.

She was a delight to have as a neighbour. It was a privilege to have known her: even if it was for a mere 1/4 of her life! To me, she was a role model and real inspiration on how to live life. She will be sorely missed.

My very first memories of Jane probably go back to 1957 (about as far back as my memories go!). Charlie Dawkins, who lived at Shalden Lodge, had sold Mike and Jane the land in Southwood Road in, I think, 1952 on which to build their house and my father, John, carried out the legal work so the families all knew each other well. Jane was always involved in events in the village, whether it was the Flower Show (the forerunner of the fête), fund-raising in the Village Hall, the Women's Institute, the Harvest Supper ... in fact just about everything.

She has always had the most remarkable memory and on our return to Shalden in 2007, she reminded me that Stancombe Lane used to be so narrow that when my sister rode her horse up it, she was brushing the vegetation on both sides! She could also remember the names of all the families, and where they lived in the village, going back to the 1950s; what a wonderful source of information she was. But it wasn't just her memory that was quite amazing, her fitness was equally impressive. Right up until she moved from Shalden, she would go for walks round the village, scaling the various stiles along the way like a teenager. I'm sure we would all wish for a constitution like Jane's and we will miss her cheery laugh and her wonderful company. She lived a long and fulfilling life – a life well lived.

Jane was always so friendly, open-minded and interested in other people and how they were doing, even as she had her own challenges with ageing and failing eyesight. We will miss her very much.

We have known Jane since 1991 and I remember working together on the lottery bid money for the village hall extension.

The large box of cheese rolls, flasks of coffee and biscuits for the Bradley shoot beaters every two weeks in the season and then joining the beating line, undeterred by brambles, bracken and nettles.

Always busy either PCC, Village Hall, Garden Club, Wi, Fireworks often in loyal support of Mike her husband.

And after she moved to Parkstone meeting us at the station each year in spite of her poor

eyesight and coming back to wave us off.

The 59th (yes – 59th!) season of organ recitals starts on October 7th 2025 and we are delighted to welcome William Fox to give the first recital.

William Fox is the Director of Music at St Albans Cathedral, where he directs the Cathedral Choirs and oversees all aspects of the Cathedral's musical life. He is also Musical Director of the St Albans Bach Choir.

Previously, William spent six years working at St Paul's Cathedral, London, first as Sub Organist and latterly as Assistant Director of Music. William began his musical education as a chorister at York Minster, before holding organ scholarships at Wells and Hereford Cathedrals.

William also teaches at the Royal Birmingham Conservatoire and gives recitals throughout the UK. In 2021 and 2022 he performed the complete organ works of Johann Sebastian Bach in a series of 30 recitals at St Paul's



His recording of the organ works of Cecilia McDowall was released in 2021, gaining 5 * reviews in *Choir and Organ* and *The Organ*. As a continuo and orchestral organist William has recently appeared with the Gabrieli Consort and Players, Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment, the City of London Sinfonia and the Cardinal's Musick.

William's programme includes works by British composers John Stainer, William Byrd, Percy Whitlock and Francis Potts as well as Johann Sebastian Bach and Nadia Boulanger.

The second Honey harvest of the year is now on. As stated last month there is a record amount

of ten Supers to process and I will be extracting honey from the comb in the frames this weekend.

This is a team effort, especially as the roles involve an uncapping station, and a spinner. It is best overseen by a co-ordinator who ensures the other roles have few bottle necks and can supplement when necessary. The uncapping station is where the frames are removed from the Super and the wax capping is removed from the honeycomb, exposing the honey in the cells underneath. The removal can be carried out using several different methods, but we've found it is best done using an uncapping fork to lift the wax off without too much damage to the honeycomb itself. This fork is just a hand-held tool about the same size as the width of a normal fork, with smaller elongated prongs. Once the cappings have been removed from both sides of the frame, the frames are put into a stainless steel 'Spinner'. The cappings go into a tray with holes in where honey can drip down into a collector below. The spinner takes four frames at a time and is spun manually. but not too fast or the honey comb may come out of the frames. Once no more honey is issuing from the frames, they are the turned round so the other side can be done. The spinner usually takes about 12 frames worth of honey before it gets full, then the honey is transferred to a filter and tub. Once the tub is full it is allowed to settle for a week or so before jarring and labelling.

Last month I forgot to mention I collected two swarms, from a friend in the village who had a nest in his roof. Both swarms were distributed to new homes via the Basingstoke Bee Club, of which I am a member. These are usually new Beekeepers or ones who have lost one of their own colonies. Keep an eye out for the 'Honey for Sale' pot at the end of our drive.

COUNTRY MATTERS - Harvest is (almost) over

There has been little rain in the last month and the rainfall since the end of January has been minimal – just 220 mm (8.9 ins). If February is excluded just 121 mm (4.9 ins) have fallen in the last 5 months and August is little different with the weather forecast indicating continuing dryness until September at least. The rainfall so far in August has been just 8 mm (0.3 ins). The annual rolling rainfall has now dropped to 959mm (38.8 ins). Sadly, I am old enough to remember the last time that the UK experienced such a dry spell – 1976 – when I was working on a farm prior to going to College. When it did start raining it did not stop! It was very difficult to harvest the autumn crops – potato and sugar beet that year.

The local harvest is almost complete as I write this article on 13th August – just a few acres of spring barley plus the spring and winter sown bean crops. The beans may be difficult to harvest because the pods are very brittle due to the dry weather and will shatter when harvested with many of the beans spilling to the ground which cannot be harvested. Additionally, because of the lack of rain the stems are very short and the pods are very close to the ground where large flints are lying on the soil surface. If stones are picked up during the cutting process they can badly damage the machine if they enter the threshing mechanism - a big and potentially expensive problem. To reduce the losses the beans may be cut at night and the early morning when the stems and pods are less brittle.

There are also some crops of forage maize being grown locally which will be cut and chopped before being transported to the anaerobic digester (AD) plant at Herriard to

produce electricity. The crop is ensiled to prevent a deterioration in quality before being used during the next 12 months to fuel the (AD) process. The AD digestate – material that is left after the crop is used to produce electricity – will probably be returned to the fields around here as a fertiliser. The AD plants work 24 hrs a day 7 days a week producing electricity using mostly automated machinery and systems. It is crucial to keep a correct balance of inputs (feedstock) so that the bacteria thrive and produce methane for the electricity generation – a highly skilled job.

Some farmers may sow cover crops in the next few weeks – there is certainly time after the early end to harvest – which are intended to improve the soil structure, lock in any nitrogen left from the previous crop and also "fix" or (naturally produce more nitrogen) through the leguminous process which uses naturally occurring bacteria for the process. The seed is not cheap and if it does not rain the seed is unlikely to germinate and is therefore wasted.

For those of you who enjoy the warmth and heat of summer 2025 make the most of it – the day length is noticeably shorter and the trees are beginning to shed leaves with autumnal colours – but even that has compensations because of the beautiful hues.






