Numerous houses in Shalden – and beyond - benefitted from his skill as a builder and so his legacy will endure. We send much love and condolences to all his family.

#### **Walter James Nash**

Known as Jim by all who knew him, Walter James Nash was born on the 5th March 1933 in West Meon, the third child of 4, having an older sister, Louise, always shortened to 'Lou', an elder brother Frank, and a younger sister Peggy.

His family moved to Binstead when he was still an infant.

While growing up there he ran the Binstead Football and Cricket teams. He was an accomplished medium pace and spin bowler with hundreds of wickets to his name, and a tough left back defender in the football team.

He also met his future wife, Norah, in the Cedars Pub in Binstead, which Norah's uncle

owned. He was 21 years old when they met. They were to have a long and happy marriage.

He served his apprenticeship in the building trade and it was while building a new house in Shalden – to be named 'Gasons' and later renamed Beechcroft – that he was offered the opportunity to rent 'Oliver's Cottage'. He accepted this and moved in, in 1961.

In 1963 their son Peter was born and they became part of village life. Jim and a few others took on the challenge of clearing the overgrown recreation ground. Rob Preece's father at Shalden Green, took



them and his tractor to Basingstoke and collected some unused chicken houses. These were transformed into the former pavilion and changing rooms, and the recreation ground was brought back to life from under the weeds. Shalden men's football team was born, this he and Vic Vaughn ran for many years, even starting and running a Shalden boys' team a few years later.

As the years passed, he found great joy in his garden and was an accomplished vegetable grower. He was often to be seen walking his beloved dog Rounders for miles across the fields and around the village.

At the time of his passing at 92 years old, he had spent a happy 64 years in Shalden, driving and gardening to the end.

He leaves Norah, his beloved wife of nearly 64 years, Peter his son, 3 grandsons, Jason, Adam and Travis, a step-granddaughter Chelsea, great grandchildren Skyla and Arlo and step-granddaughters Effie and Robyn.

He was a truly lovely man who has left a huge hole in the family's life – he will be very missed.

WILD LIFE Diana Tennyson

'Oceans': At the time of writing, Sunday, 8 June, is World Ocean Day, (WOD) and what better way to spend it than admiring our magnificent, beautiful and diverse oceans. This event takes place every year on 8 June, and the concept was originally proposed in 1992 by Canada's International Centre for Ocean Development (ICOD) and the Ocean Institute of Canada at the Earth - UN Conference on Environment and Development in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

Sadly, it has been marked by Sir David Attenborough's discussion with Prince William about the sad state of our oceans due to the 'unspeakable damage' being done by trawlers dredging and bottom trawling on the seabed. There will shortly be a conference in France and Sir David will stress the need to protect the ocean. We must not 'destroy this treasure' says Sir David. While speaking about our oceans, it is also a relief to hear that visitors are to be prevented from touching squid, octopuses, etc., and animals are to be given more space in zoos and at zoo parks.

**Garden wildlife:** I am often contacted by residents with pictures and information about raptors in their gardens or near their homes. Everything from Kestrels in Blackberry Lane (thanks to Finlegh) to Owls in Alton, and as you will have noted from last month's issue,

I am not adverse to Blackbird fledglings. Anything unusual should be reported to the Hampshire Wild Bird Recorder, Martin Pitt, Em: mjpitt35clere@hotmail.com. Keith Betton now deals with recording and protecting rare wild birds.

I am also contacted by residents about their Great Crested Newts, but happy to hearfrom anyone with a pond and newts in their gardens. It was also truly a delight to hear from Gillian who told me about the fox cubs in her garden. She did manage to take a picture, but they are ever so quick as she pointed out!

**Badgers:** The badger clan residing in the SINC (woodland to the rear of 131 Winchester Road) continue to do well and I check mammal paths around the village where they generally forage. Their foraging range is generally not more than a three mile radius from their main sett. Distances do vary and can be further in the summer and closer to home in the autumn and winter. The presence of habitats rich in food sources, e.g. earthworms can affect their foraging distances.

I know several people in Blackberry Lane who feed them, and establishing a feeding station in your garden can offer moments of delight for all the family when they appear. What do they eat? Peanuts are a great favourite, the type you put out for wild birds will be fine, not the salty variety. They also enjoy most cereals and won't turn their noses up at bread or toast. Peanut butter sandwiches are a great favourite too!

It has been delightful watching badgers having a good scratch on 'Springwatch' this year. They use scent marking and communal latrines to mark their territories, and often travel to these points to reinforce their boundaries. Apart from the large sett in



the SINC woodland, we also have a remarkable badger sett in Badger Close, the Badger Protected Area (BPA). This is one of the few developments in the country where badgers and humans live side by side in relative harmony, and both share mammal paths - footpaths around the development. Humans use these footpaths during daylight hours, and badgers after dark.

#### Mammal path used by Badgers (Blackberry Lane)

Badgers in the UK are nocturnal omnivores and get most of their diet from earthworms, although they will eat any of the items I have mentioned above. They have all the hallmarks of being a good attack animal, but they are generally very shy and avoid contact with other animals. Incidents of badgers injuring cats or other pets are virtually unheard of. Under the Protection of Badgers Act, badger baiters can receive a prison sentence for harming or killing a badger, or interfering with a badger sett.

Badgers do not generally hibernate. They go into a state of torpor (similar to a Dormouse), an extended sleep where they will wake intermittently to forage for food, use the ablutions and move around. Sadly we see more dead badgers on the

road because they move around more, and often become part of a housing development. We can contact Hart Wildlife Rescue if we see any wounded wild animal on our roads. Badgers are known for their monogamous mating habits. Boars, the male badgers, are likely to mate with one sow (female) for life. They can mate at any time of the year, but usually give birth in the Spring.

#### **EVENT REPORT**

#### A PUBLIC TALK IN MEDSTEAD ON CANCER

Mansfield Park Surgery Patient Participation Group were pleased to host a public talk recently on Cancer, Prevention and treatment at Medstead Village Hall .

Dr Julie Smallwood, a GP at the surgery, specializes in cancer diagnosis and treatment She has been a Wessex Cancer Alliance GP Advisor for the last year and prior to that was the Clinical Cancer Lead in East Surrey for 10 Years

She began her presentation talking about the 4 most common cancers, Breast, Lung, Bowel and Prostrate. She discussed how these were diagnosed and the types of treatments available, emphasizing that the treatment type is very often specific to a person. Surgery, radiotherapy, chemotherapy and palliative care were discussed in detail. She mentioned that palliative care can often have a very long duration. The importance of screening was mentioned as this can identify problems when they are more easily treatable. Although screening can be age specific, it is still possible to request screening at other times if there is a concern.

Dr Smallwood said that if anyone had concerns about a change in their body or bodily functions, she would recommend a discussion with a GP. Referrals can then be made to rule out cancer, or identify it at a very early stage. She said that a very high percentage of referrals of this type did not reveal a cancer, but relieved a lot of anxiety for the patient.

Dr Smallwood then discussed prevention, endorsing the well-established factors that a reduction in alcohol and smoking are key, as well as regular exercise. Sugary drinks and processed meat are all known to be harmful although neither are actually carcinogenic.

The evening continued with a second talk by Claire Gill, from Macmillan Cancer Support. She is a dietician, and drew the distinction between dieticians, who are regulated and nutritionists who are not. She went on to say there is a lot of misinformation on the internet, often prompted by commercial interest. If you search for healthy food on the internet you will get over 2 million responses. She stated that there is no such thing as a superfood.

For patients who have, or have had, cancer, diet is critical. Often the appetite is suppressed and skill is needed to prepare a diet which is suitable and healthy. She emphasized that it is important that a meal is enjoyable as well as healthy. She gave many tips, such as including a handful of lentils into a meal to increase fibre, rather than present a full plate which some may not enjoy.

The talk was well attended and both clinicians responded to a number of questions from the audience.

This is the second talk organized by the Mansfield Park Patient Participation Group, the first being a talk on Cardiology by Dr Peter Savill. One of the objectives of the group is to promote public health awareness, and to make this as public as possible. Other talks will follow.

Mansfield Park Surgery is based on the boundary of Four Marks and Medstead and currently has 7000 patients on role, but with a capacity for many more. For more information, contact Louise Webb on 01420 562922



#### ALTON THE ROTARY CLUB OF ALTON

A school that's different

Alton Rotary members were told recently of a local school that aims to be very different in what it offers its pupils. It's the Green Room School, based at a 150-acre farm at Kingsley in the North Hampshire countryside just outside Alton.

The school began with six children, but now has 40 pupils, housed in special premises on the working farm. It caters for children who have previously been home-schooled, often because they have been excluded from conventional schools.

Members of Alton Rotary with Alastair Blaber

One of those who helped found the school, Alastair Blaber, said that as well as more conventional subjects such as maths and English, the timetable includes sessions on



bushcraft, land-based studies, and construction. There are also periods on the timetable devoted to caring for a wide range of farm animals. In the bushcraft sessions, pupils learn how to make fire using flint and steel, and then how to use the fire to cook for themselves, and how to survive outdoors using a weatherproof shelter on the site. The land studies module includes caring for animals and the management and upkeep of allotment and polytunnel areas. As well as the bushcraft sessions, Alastair gets involved in teaching tractor-driving skills to some of the pupils – a very popular element in the curriculum.

#### Report of a visit to Hever Castle on 22nd May 2025

Hever Castle in Kent was the destination of the NHNTC outing in May – and what an outing! Our driver, Nick of Farnham Coaches, had a hard journey, made the more difficult by the long queues of cars on the M25 (beware the interception with the A30) and the narrow, winding roads of rural Kent. Once at Hever we had the run of the place for  $4^{1/2}$  hours – hardly long enough, though, to take in all the wonders of this treasure trove of memories of our past monarchs and English aristocracy.

With thunder forecast for later in the afternoon, most of us headed for the magnificent gardens with their waterways, lake and extensive lawns, bordered by spectacular displays of seasonal flowers and shrubs. The yew maze was not too challenging but the water maze, with its hidden water-spout switches hidden in the stepping stones, allowed few to escape without a few splashes, if not a soaking.

The afternoon was spent learning the story of the Castle itself and touring round its magnificent and beautifully restored rooms. These have been set up to cover the history and lifestyles of the various families who had called it home.

Hever was built in 1270 with a massive Gatehouse and walled Bailey, surrounded by a moat and approached over a wooden drawbridge. In the 15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> century, the castle was improved and gentrified by Thomas Bullen whose granddaughters, Mary and Anne Boleyn, became in turn mistress and second wife of Henry VIII. Later the castle became the home of Henry's third wife, Ann of Cleves, by then the ex-Queen.

More history was to follow in the persons of the Astor family who acquired the estate in the 20th century and further developed the Castle and surrounding lands, bringing it to the memorable visit it is today.

#### **REGULAR FEATURES**

Two weeks ago, I took off two more supers from the hives. These were not only very full - 95%,

but also mostly capped – 90%. Ideally, all cells in the honeycomb would be full, capped, and even better if it was all nice and level, or flat. Having flat/level honeycomb makes it easier for uncapping. Due to lots of different variables this is very unlikely, I've never seen a perfect honeycomb. So, in all we had six supers to extract, and the team managed this in a couple of hours, producing about 40kg. This was left to settle for a week, and we jarred it up in a weekend. They are now on sale at our gate at Horsley, Southwood Road, Shalden. As usual, if you need more than five jars please let me know and we can arrange a collection. If there are none there, please come to the house.

Honey is extracted from the honeycomb on the frames using a manual spinner, which takes four frames at a time. When empty, the frames are returned to the super and the super is put back on the hive from which it came. All the equipment also goes into the apiary and the bees go mad and have a big party as they don't have to forage until it is all cleared up, about a week later. As well as clearing up the excess honey they also recover

most of the wax cappings. I often see many wasps gate crashing the party too. I inspected the hives yesterday and there are already another two Supers nearly ready to be taken off. I expect another harvest end of August/September.

As I said in last month's edition, I have plenty of bees now and no empty hives, so do not need a swarm. However, I'm happy to collect if you see one in a dangerous or awkward position. Remember the phrase "A swarm in May is worth a load of hay, a swarm in June is worth a silver spoon but a swarm July ain't worth a fly". This is largely because the colony will take a couple of months to build wax comb for brood and make enough honey for winter. However, if a Beekeeper has an empty hive with comb and some honey stores all ready to go (unlike me), this will make a swarm in July much more viable.

#### **COUNTRY MATTERS**

Rain – or the lack of it – is the weather news. May was very dry – 13.25 mm (0.54 ins) has resulted in a **total** for March, April and May of 46.25 mm (1.87 ins). In January the rolling annual rainfall was 1283 mm (52 ins), February 1226.5 mm, March 1100.5 mm, April 1033.5 mm and May 883.25 mm (35.7 ins). The rain in June (1st – 10 th) has been about 36 mm (1.46 ins) but there is little rain forecast for the days ahead.

The sheep have enjoyed the dry weather and the lambs are growing well. I have plenty of grazing for the flock spread over several fields but growth has been much less than other years. I have heard one report of the first cut of silage yielding only 1/3 of a normal year from the same acreage. Later cuts may make up some of the lost yield but will never match the high nutritional value of the first cut of grass.

I have now shorn the ewes – all in one day – which I was pleased about and they seemed relieved to be able to cool off in the warm days. The wool is a great insulator both from hot and cold and they can keep themselves cool with the fleeces on so long as they do not expend too much energy – they just lie under a tree (preferably one which has a breeze). The problem created by this is that they graze less if only sitting under a tree and therefore may lose condition or produce less milk. This year



the ewes were generally well fleshed when their coats were removed including those with triplets. Once the wool had regrown a little the ewes and lambs were treated with a spray to prevent fly strike.

I have just returned from a short trip to Northern France. The roadside view indicated that the French crops were good. Some winter barleys were beginning to ripen and I would guess that the combines will be rolling in the areas I visited within 2 weeks. The wheat, oilseed and barley looked good. The maize crops were patchy in places reflecting the dry spring but the linseed crops were impressive. There were very few combining pea crops that I spotted – a change from previous years.

In the UK the first crops will be cut in late June but for the majority of farms harvest will not begin until July. The wet spring in 2024 resulted in many diseased crops despite the application of fungicides. By comparison the dry spring of 2025 has left the crops looking much cleaner and enabled the fungicide applications to be scaled back from the levels of 2024.

The Woodland Trust has reported that woodland cover in the UK land area has increased from 13.2% in 2020 to 13.5% in 2024 which seems to be quite a large increase although below the target levels. The comment attached to the report says that wildlife is reducing because of the deteriorating ecological condition within woodland. A cynic might suggest that certainly in the south of England the increasing number of people (and dogs) reduce the opportunities for natural species to live and breed in an undisturbed

environment! Whilst walking a footpath 10 days ago I found a mole scurrying along. It was apparently healthy but a rare sight these days – I wonder if the dry and therefore hard ground made it difficult to dig and burrow?


